From generation to generation By our Roving Reporter

Our series of Jubilee talks ended with an afternoon's talk by the four rabbis who have served our community during the past 50 years.

Each rabbi told us about his (or her) journey to becoming a BRS rabbi. There was humour - with stories about being interviewed – and history, with memories of tutors at Leo Baeck College, survivors of the lost world of European Jewish scholarship. We also heard about the experience of being one of the first women in the Reform rabbinate.

Each rabbi was attracted to BRS for different reasons – and the same reasons; they all realised that a shul that had been built by its members was the clearest expression of the members' commitment and determination. All of the rabbis were affected by the warmth of our congregation, members' willingness to do whatever was necessary to help the shul run smoothly and efficiently and, as always, the well-known BRS welcome to all newcomers.

Even after the former rabbis had moved away from being congregational rabbis, BRS still left an *"indelible imprint"* on them and they described their time as *"fine, moving and beautiful"*.

Every shul has different strengths – in a small community like Bromley people know each other and are able to embrace families and to form friendships.

If we can approach the future with openness rather than fear, while maintaining our traditions, we will be following our founders' example.

A Year of Celebration - View from the Board

Well, we're nearly at the end of the celebrations of Bromley Reform Synagogue's Golden Jubilee – 50 years of existence, 45 here in our building, Beit Or, in Highland Road. There is just one more special event to come – the Jubilee Civic Service on Shabbat, 24 January, 2015.

It was wonderful to see so many members filling the sanctuary for our Jubilee Service on 8 November, 2014 – from founder members who have been with us all these years and founder members whose lives have taken them away from Bromley, but who came back to celebrate with us, to those who had only recently joined. I for one was delighted to see Sylvia Harris and her family. Sylvia was choir leader while her husband Henry was organist, and I heard many stories of them when researching the synagogue's history, including the time the organ caught fire...

We were fortunate to have three of our four Rabbis, past and present, taking part in the service. One special feature was the calling up of everyone present onto the bima to bless the scroll. We went up in turn according to the decade in which we joined - founder members first, then those who joined in the 60s, 70s and so on. What was remarkable and pleasing was the way in which this demonstrated how our membership has been steadily growing. We are not an ageing community and, while inevitably many move away as their lives change, new members are joining every year. This bodes very well indeed for the next 50 years!

All four of our Rabbis joined us on 14 December for the last of the social events, each reminiscing and telling us what for them made and makes Bromley Shul so special. And they all agreed that it is the people, from those whose vision started it all to those who have followed over the years. As Sylvia said, Bromley members are amateurs in the true sense of the word, the Latin derivation, they do what they do for and with love. The Jubilee Tea Party which followed saw a packed Garden Room enjoy a delicious tea with not one but two special cakes as we caught up with friends - and Rabbis old and new. The draw was made for the grand Jubilee Raffle - well done to the winners. A total of £1020 was raised for

the Transport Fund, so thanks to everyone who supported and organised it.

It has been wonderful to see "full houses" for many of the talks arranged by the Education Committee, with speakers Leon Smith from Nightingale, Sir Anthony Seldon, Rt Hon John Bercow, Speaker of the House of Commons, and Rabbi Baroness Julia Neuberger all giving interesting, entertaining – and controversial – talks. Plenty for us to talk about still!

We have enjoyed a Quiz Evening, Treasure Hunt, Picnic and Fashion Show, and had a visiting Cantor for one weekend. I am sure the Board and all our members would like me to thank everyone who has played a part, large or small, in ensuring that these events have happened, been successful - and raised some money for the synagogue. The Caring Community has organised a lasting memory of the anniversary - a wooden seat with commemorative plaque that has now been installed by Bromley Council at the corner of Highland Road and Madeira Avenue - a nice resting place after struggling up the hill!

A history of the first 50 years now exists - I am just waiting for members to send me comments/corrections/omissions before the final edition will be available. Perhaps this is a good point for me to pay tribute to our founder members whose tireless efforts and devotion made Bromley Shul what it is. Those of us who have followed them must make sure that we do not fail in the future to continue what they started. Times have changed over the last fifty years but the synagogue continues to play its part in all our lives in one way or another, be it as Beit Tefillah, Beit Knesset or Beit Midrash - a place for worship, social gatherings or study. It is up to each one of us to make the most of everything it has to offer.

What have we learned from the year? How wonderful it is to see the synagogue full for a service or a talk – would that it happened more often and not just on special occasions. With a full house, every service would be special and sound great as we raised our voices to those wonderful rafters our founders gave to us. Those of us who organise events would love to see so many people each time. How can we achieve this?

An Exciting Opportunity for You to Travel to Eastern Europe

ne of the treasures in our synagogue is a Torah scroll from the Czech Jewish community of Bzenec. Jews lived in that small town for centuries; however, some fled and many more were deported and killed as the Nazis spread across Europe. Whole communities were gone, but their religious artefacts, including Torah scrolls, were left behind. Many of these items were collected and stored in Prague during the war, and eventually came into the custody of Westminster Synagogue about 50 years ago. Westminster Synagogue in turn loaned out approximately 1,500 of these Torah scrolls to other synagogues around the world. Bromley Reform Synagogue has two of these scrolls, including the one from Bzenec.

Recently, Rabbi Harvey Winokur of Temple Kehillat Chaim in suburban Atlanta, Georgia contacted me. His synagogue, like ours, has a Torah scroll from Bzenec. Including our two synagogues, there are a total of nine synagogues currently in possession of a scroll from Bzenec (all but Bromley are located in the United States). Last vear. Rabbi Winokur travelled to London to take part in the 50 year anniversary ceremony of the Czech scrolls arriving at Westminster Synagogue. The anniversary ceremony was very moving for him. When he returned home, he did more research on Bzenec and decided to help organise a trip for his synagogue members to Eastern Europe, to learn more about the history of the Jewish community. This trip is now planned, and Rabbi Winokur has graciously invited the members of our synagogue, along with the members of the other synagogues with Torah scrolls from Bzenec, to come along. The trip goes from July 13-20, 2015 and begins and ends in Prague. In addition to Prague, the trip will go to Budapest, Vienna, and, of course, Bzenec. Highlights of the trip include:

- Explore the Story of Jewish Budapest over the past 150 Years, including visits to:
 - The Dohany Street Synagogue, the largest in Europe.

- The Jewish Museum, housed on the site of Theodor Herzl's birth.
- The Community Holocaust Memorial.
- Visit the Vienna Temple (Stadtempel), the only surviving synagogue from pre-WWII days, located near the Judenplatz, the main square of the Jewish community for nearly 500 years.
- A tour of Bzenec, where one of our Torah scrolls originated, including a visit to the Jewish cemetery.
- An Inside Look into the Czech Republic- Politics, Economics & Society Dialogue with Mr Peter Brod, former BBC Bureau Chief and Radio Free Europe activist.
- Guided visit through Jewish Prague, including the Old Ghetto, the Precious Legacy Exhibit at the Jewish Museum and the Jewish Cemetery, as well as:
 - The Altneu Shul, the longest continually used synagogue in Europe and site of the first use of the Magen David.
 - The Maisel Synagogue, named after a Jewish mayor of Prague, exemplifies the Golden Age of Jewish Prague.
 - The Pincus Synagogue, a memorial to the Jews of Prague who died in the Holocaust.
 - The Old Cemetery, with the graves of such Jewish luminaries as Judah Loew, the Maharal, and Mordechai Maisels, and the ceremonial hall with the wellknown Hevra Kadisha paintings.
 - The Spanish Synagogue built in 1868 on the site of the oldest

Prague Jewish house of prayer ("the Old Shul") and designed in a Moorish style by Vojtech Ignátz Ullmann.

Talmud Study Classes Rabbi Jason Holtz, Instructor

The Talmud is the foundational literature of Rabbinic Judaism. Full of legend and law, its teachings have guided Jews for thousands of years, and it is still hugely influential. No prior knowledge is necessary for this course, but it will be challenging and thought provoking for all.

Students will need to bring their own copy of Tractate Berachot, and it is recommended that they bring a Tenach (Bible) as well. Many publishers have printed a version of the Talmud that will work well, but the Koren Talmud, with a translation and commentary by Rabbi Adin Steinsaltz, is recommended. This version can be purchased from Amazon.co.uk

The course meets on Thursdays from 10:30-11:45 am and will resume on 15 January 2015.

Needless to say, the children will be offered a place on the basis of need alone, regardless of religion or ethnicity. The project is under the auspices of Youth 4 Youth at Finchley Reform Synagogue, although it will be run entirely by Manya and me. FRS is lending us much needed administrative support, but no financial help.

We propose to run a five-day residential camp aimed at those children currently in school years 5 and 6 (aged between 9 and 11). We will offer a range of arts, sports, drama, music, discussion and creative sessions. The camp will be led by trained, experienced and DBS checked volunteers from RSY, our youth movement. This person will work approximately 10-15 hours per month, depending upon where we are on the Jewish and synagogue calendar. Many of these hours will be at the weekend.

ROLE AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Teaching primarily liturgical, but also non-liturgical, music to children of all ages at cheder, which meets on Sunday mornings.
- Musical participation in religious services on a regular basis, including planning new, varied approaches to service music. Services responsibilities include approximately two Shabbat services a month, Family Shabbat and some Jewish festivals.
- Assisting and encouraging the choir to learn and perform a variety of musical pieces for a variety of religious events
- Recruiting new choir members
- Planning and scheduling rehearsals and performances
- Developing music throughout the community including possible performances, concerts, etc.
- Providing musical leadership in music during services
- Planning and preparing special music for events throughout the year

QUALIFICATIONS AND EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Formal musical and teaching qualifications are desirable, but not essential, if experience is relevant. Should have an interest in and knowledge of a wide range of music.

PREFERRED SKILLS

- A good knowledge of Jewish music and Reform (or Progressive) Judaism.
- Ability to work confidently and comfortably with both children and adults.
- Ability to play an accompanying instrument such as guitar and/or piano.
- Dependable, responsible, self-motivated and creative.

The Year on the Board

Joe Millis, our Board of Deputies Representative reports

It's been a pretty hectic year at the Board of Deputies, what with a rise in anti-Semitism connected, by and large, to Israel's Protective Edge campaign in Gaza in the summer. Also, this year, after one of the ugliest campaigns in BoD history, the pro-peace, pro-Israel group, Yachad, which lobbies for a two-state solution to the Israel-Palestine conflict, gained membership of the representative body. I say ugly - and even Board veterans (and believe me, there are some really veteran veterans at the BoD) can't remember such lobbying. Some of it was disgraceful, close to libellous and, irony of ironies, from people living abroad in Israel.

But in the end it all came good as Yachad was accepted on to the Board by the required two-thirds majority – 135 to 61. I have to say, and despite the ugly anti-Yachad campaign, it was probably one of the best, most informative and well-mannered debates we have had in my two-and-a-half years as your representative.

But back to anti-Semitism, which did rear its ugly head during the summer (although, thankfully, tolerant Britain wasn't as bad as France or elsewhere). One good thing to come out of the summer was the first ever joint statement between the BoD, as the democratic representative body of British Jews, and its Muslim counterpart, the Muslim Council of Britain.

The historic statement –a "significant step forward in relations" – said: "We must continue to work hard for

good community relations in the UK. "We must not import conflict. We mu

"We must not import conflict. We must export peace instead. While everyone has the right to voice their political opinion, be that in a rally or on social media, we must be mindful of how we convey our protest. There can be no excuse for racism, violence, or other forms of intimidation, when expressing views in the media, on the streets, outside shops or online. "We condemn any expression of anti-Semitism, Islamophobia or any racism."

Of course, this being the Jewish community, there was a row over whether we should be issuing joint statements with the MCB. But after a debate, the motion to adopt the statement was passed by 140-40.

On the political front, and after its successful manifesto for the European elections, the BoD has issued a comprehensive manifesto for May's general election. It doesn't endorse any party, but sets out the parameters for what the Board sees as defending the Jewish community.

And now we enter the last few months of this three-year term of the Board, before we elect a new president and honorary officers. What I would like from you is to tell me what you would like me to raise in the next three-year stint, as I have already agreed to be your representative once again. 
