



Letter from America - the Rabbi reports on

The Biennial Convention of the Union for Reform Judaism

Dear Friends,



This past month I have been very fortunate to have been on the first sabbatical of my career. I took the opportunity to attend the Biennial

Convention of the Union for Reform Judaism in Orlando, Florida (which coincidentally is very close to where I grew up as a child).

For nearly a week, 5,000 Reform Jews from around North America, and the world (including just over a dozen from the United Kingdom), came together to learn, to pray, to discuss and to celebrate. It was my first time attending Shabbat services with that many people! The choir, which included Cantor Zoe Jacobs of Finchley Reform Synagogue, was larger than what most synagogues get on any given Shabbat.

For me, the highlight of the Biennial was seeing how involved and engaged our Reform movement is in contemporary issues. On the first full day of the Biennial, all 5,000 attendees unanimously passed a resolution calling for full equality for people who are transgender. I was very proud that the only teenager to speak out in favour of this resolution was a former student of mine in Arizona. We heard from rabbis, journalists and activists about how the Reform movement has fought and is continuing to fight for issues of civil rights-and winning. US Vice President Joe Biden addressed us and instantly won over the crowd when he said that in the United States every major position that the Reform movement has ever advocated for, the country has eventually come around to support or will in time. He cited civil rights legislation that worked to end legal discrimination against racial minorities in the United States which was drafted and signed in the offices of the Reform movement in Washington, DC.

The impact of our Reform movement goes beyond the domestic politics of the United States, though. I was very moved when I heard Rabbi Ambassador David Saperstein speak. As an aside, his brother, Rabbi Marc Saperstein, teaches at Leo Baeck College here in London. I first met him when I was fourteen years old. At the time, he was a rabbi in Washington, DC advocating for social justice on behalf of the Reform movement. He ran seminars for teenagers from Reform synagogues around America and Canada on how we could translate our religious ideals of equality, dignity and so on into political action. Needless to say, his seminar had quite an impact on me! Nowadays, he has a different position. He is a United States ambassador and the highest ranking diplomat in the United States government whose sole portfolio is to advocate for religious freedoms around the world. As an example of his work, he talked about trips he has taken to places like Iraq and Saudi Arabia, where he is working to change laws that oppress religious minorities, to end the practice of punishing people for violating the laws of religious orthodoxies and to achieve reconciliation between conflicting religious groups. When he was introduced to the crowd, the Yiddish word, "nachas" or "pride" was projected onto the screen behind him. I think that Reform Jews around the world can share in the pride in knowing that one of our rabbis, shaped by our movement and our values of freedom and respect, is now in such a position to advance those values.

Of course, many things happened at the Biennial. We studied Torah together. There was always a concert going on somewhere. There were discussions on trends in synagogue administration, Jewish education, and more. I'm fortunate that I had the chance to attend and I'm so very glad that I was joined by our synagogue chair, Joanna.

By the time this is published, I'll just be arriving home in Bromley. But at the time I am writing it, I am in Cincinnati, Ohio. I'm enjoying my time here, but I am also looking forward to coming back and seeing everyone soon.

View from the Chair

Your North America correspondent writes:



Would you recognize this prayer? "Listen up, Godwrestlers – the Holy one of Blessing, our source of life, is unique"

This was just

one of the variations on the Shema that resulted from a workshop I attended during the American Union of Reform Judaism's Biennial convention, held this year in Orlando, Florida.

The woman leading this particular session, a charismatic teacher named Shira Kline was trying to get us to consider the words and terms we use to describe or refer to God. Did the ones we hear and use every day resonate with us? Or did they actually make God more distant? The audience were both amused and moved by some of the new combinations we came up with. How important it is to realise that the person next to you in Shul might not (in fact, almost certainly isn't) hearing and experiencing the service in the same way you are.

Another session, which both Rabbi Holtz and I discovered we were attending, was a presentation by the Society for Classical Reform Judaism, I think the name of the Society was what intrigued me first – what could be meant by 'classical' reform Judaism? Secondly, the specific topic was about congregational inclusivity, which is something I wanted to learn more about. One of the conference themes was "Audacious Hospitality" - that is, creating an actively welcoming movement, reflected in the affiliated shuls. Certainly it was clear that the synagogue members who spoke at this session had experienced warm welcomes for themselves and their non-Jewish partners. It was encouraging to hear about this aspect of reform.

And the 'classical' aspect of 'classical reform'? It seemed to involved services principally in English, as they were perceived as more welcoming/

less incomprehensible. I don't see this trending in Bromley, though.

New technology was in evidence in various conference sessions. I attended a service in the style of a shul in Charleston NC with screens next to the bimah. These were used to project any new or specific prayers which didn't appear in the Siddur (perhaps regarding a specific event). In another presentation, a Rabbi from Cleveland showed videos which were made by her congregants to communicate with each other and of course with the outside world. They were made to a very high standard, and served as excellent publicity material. It was great to be able to see and experience some innovative ideas. Even if we never decide to use these ideas or find them relevant to our congregation's needs, it is worth seeing them in action. These might become the 'classical' ideas of the future!

The MRJ were well represented in Orlando; I believe they hosted a tea party! Some of these ideas from the dozens of sessions might creep across the Atlantic. Progressive Judaism can't stand still (Hint- the clues is in the name) and the Biennial provided many thought provoking concepts for consideration.

Syria Refugee Crisis

As a result of the Rabbi's sermons over the High Holy Days the Board has donated (on behalf of our synagogue) from a Discretionary Fund the sum of £1500 to the Syrian Aid Fund, via World Jewish Relief.

They have since thanked and informed us that 2000 educational packs, including school supplies and hygiene kits, have been distributed to refugee children in Turkey, allowing them to settle into their new school surroundings. They also intend to provide temporary accommodation to the most vulnerable, along with humanitarian packages including food and medical supplies.

A Very Special Place

A dark evening, at the end of October, was lightened by a talk given by **Helen Simmons**, Chief Executive of Nightingale Hammerson - South London's Nightingale House and North London's Hammerson House have amalgamated to form Nightingale Hammerson

Every talk is unique, but this particular one was also a historical landmark; Helen Simmons is the first non-Jewish Chief Executive in Nightingale House's 175-year-old history and first female CEO. Helen Simmons is an engaging, warm and direct speaker. We heard how her experiences of working in the voluntary sector and, specifically, with Jewish organisations, had affected her, professionally and personally.

When she described visiting Yad Vashem, she said that she "wasn't the same person afterwards." Her listeners sensed that her response was truly heartfelt.

The future of Nightingale Hammerson looks as optimistic as it is possible for any charity to be – she answered questions clearly – Nightingale Hammerson provides and will continue to provide care, exclusively for the Jewish community, for people who have lived a Jewish way of life.

As a former financial director for Jewish Care, she has found – and continues to look for – opportunities to secure the future. An NHS trust has successfully used unoccupied areas of the existing Nightingale House site for



Care for the Carer? Lesley Wines, Social Work & Family Carers Team Manager, Jewish Care

According to Carers UK, 1 in 8 of the UK population is a carer and there are hundreds more young carers supporting parents or siblings who are hidden from that statistic. The number of carers is growing daily, with an estimated 6,000 people taking on a caring responsibility every day. Over 1 million people care for more than one person, often juggling their caring responsibilities with work and other commitments.

Without these carers our local health and social care system would fall apart. The vital role that carers play is often taken for granted, even at times by those closest to them.

On top of their day to day lives, carers devote most of their time and energy to their caring role, leaving little or no time for themselves. Many carers struggle on with the stress of caring without asking for help, feeling isolated and on their own. Whilst there is support available for carers from organisations like ourselves we realise it has its limits. That's why an offer of a little bit of help from a friend, shul member or neighbour can make a huge difference.

As we approach 2016, New Year's resolutions or not, why not take a few minutes to stop and think about those neighbours or friends around you who could do with a little bit more help to make their day a bit brighter. Every bit of support helps when you are caring – the small things that other people do help to make the role of being a carer a bit more manageable.

It doesn't take huge amounts of time to make a real difference, just doing one thing to allow a carer to take a break from caring can make the day so much brighter. Offering to visit or have a cup of tea with a person cared for so that their carer can have some time to themselves. Lending a hand with the shopping, going out for a coffee and just listening to a carer talk can help to lighten the load so they know they are not on their own and there are others in their community who care about them too.

Trekking for Life

A syou may know, the Alice Faith Mittelman Foundation was established almost 16 years ago after the tragic loss of Michael and Laura Mittelman's 2-year-old daughter Alice from pneumococcal meningitis over the course of one truly dreadful weekend. The onset of this disease was not only very rapid, but it carried no significant warning signs so that one moment she was laughing and playing with her sisters, Molly and Emma, and almost the next she was on life support machines



in the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. The hole she has left behind can never be filled.

Since its inception, the Foundation has raised significant funds for meningitis research. Its supporters have undertaken various challenging climbs, including Mount Cotopaxi in Ecuador, Machu Picchu in Peru, the 3 Peaks Challenge in Britain and the Three Volcanoes in Italy, trekking to the Base Camp of Everest, cycling from London to Paris and completing the London 100 bike ride. The Foundation has helped to fund important research projects at the Universities of Sussex and Manchester and at the Children's Hospital in Boston, USA. It was also instrumental in the adoption of the pneumococcal vaccine into the childhood immunisation programme in the UK and contributed to the Parliamentary report on pneumococcal disease prevention in the developing world.

In February 2016 the Alice Faith Mittelman Foundation is teaming up with Meningitis Now to mark their 30th anniversary in the fight against meningitis in a new fundraising initiative. Like the Alice Faith Mittelman Foundation, the vision of Meningitis Now is to see a future free from meningitis and to support those who have already been affected by this dreadful disease. **Michael Mittelman**, together with his eldest daughter **Molly** and his sister-in-law **Shane Lask** and a group of 35 other friends and supporters will be taking part in a nine-day trek through Patagonia, crossing from Argentina to Chile through some of the most rugged terrain of the Andes to raise much needed funds to continue the vital work of research, public education and ongoing support.

Statement from Rabbi Laura Janner-Klausner on the attacks in Paris

Reform Judaism condemns the shocking attacks in Paris. Our thoughts and prayers are with all the innocent victims. When I visited Paris in the aftermath of the Charlie Hebdo and Hypercacher shootings earlier this year, the recurrence of terrorist attacks on an even larger scale would have been unthinkable. Tragically that prospect has now become reality.

This is a battle of ideas: between those who believe in those universal values of liberty, equality and fraternity, and those who do not. These attacks must not result in increased discrimination against our Muslim brothers and sisters and already vulnerable refugees, Muslim or otherwise, who have come to Europe in search of safer shores. As British Jews, we above all stand in solidarity with the people of France at this time, and send prayers of healing and consolation.

May the One who brings peace in the highest, bring peace to us and to all Israel and to the whole world.

A Good Read

We warmly recommend *Tales from the Rabbi's Desk, Vol. 1* just published by Rabbi **Dr Walter Rothschild**.

The book is a collection of short stories that give an insight into the rich tapestry of human lives that Walter and his colleagues have touched. They are classed as "not true but authentic" in that they are fiction but largely based on real events and experiences (LJ Today).
