Some of the activities can be online, for example: discussion groups or a gaming event. You will be fully supported in this role by community volunteers, the Synagogue Board and Rabbi Laura.

This is a role that needs your creativity – you can make it your own and make your mark on the lives of our young people.

THE ROLE

- To plan, promote, organise and personally lead youth activities (from bnei mitzvah to post university ages).
- To contact and engage young adult members and facilitate activities.
- To work within the synagogue organisation, liaising with committee officials and other employees.
- Flexibility in working hours (it will be mostly weekends and evenings)
- To keep an accurate monthly online timesheet.
- To liaise with RSY and other synagogue youth workers and activities.

What you need to bring to the table

- Have a love for Jewish community
- Responsive to concerns of parents and carers
- Effective, self-motivated and systematic working
- Can work in a team and independently
- Knowledge of Health and Safety best practice, including risk assessments, safeguarding and child protection.
